## II. Active Funding

Agencies represented on the Council were asked to report on any relevant grants or earmarks currently in progress. <b>Planned Activities:</b>	The Community Based Violence Prevention Demonstration Program will allow the City and County of San Francisco to leverage local resources currently supporting San Francisco's evidence based street violence prevention model-the Community and Crisis Response Services. San Francisco proposes to consolidate CCRS program administration, to expand the crisis response program model, and to create a targeted violence prevention public awareness campaign.
<b>Population to be Served:</b>	Services will be targeted towards youth and young adults between the ages 10 and 24 that are either perpetrators or victims of street violence. Through targeted street outreach, coordinated crisis response, wrap around support services, and a citywide public awareness campaign, CCSF aims to increase awareness of the actual risks and costs of street violence, change community norms regarding street violence, and create alternatives to negative street associations.
